What You Need to Know

A Nurse Assistant's day is usually busy and varied, requiring both physical stamina and emotional resilience. They typically start their shift by receiving a handover from the outgoing staff, which includes updates on patients' conditions. Throughout the day, they perform tasks such as taking and recording vital signs, assisting patients with personal hygiene (bathing, dressing, toileting), feeding patients who need assistance, and turning or repositioning bedridden patients to prevent bedsores.

Nurse Assistants also help patients walk or move, provide comfort and emotional support, answer call lights, and ensure patients' rooms are clean and comfortable. They may help transport patients for tests or surgeries, and they often communicate with patients' families to update them on their loved one's status.

In addition to patient care, Nurse Assistants also have administrative tasks. They document patients' health status and the care they've provided, and they communicate any significant changes or concerns to the nursing staff or doctors. The end of their shift involves handing over the updates about patients' conditions to the next shift of nurses or nursing assistants. Throughout their day, Nurse Assistants work closely with healthcare professionals like Registered Nurses and doctors, making their role critical in the healthcare team.

What Do You Need To Succeed In This Role?
