Physical Therapy Aide

What You Need to Know

A Physical Therapy Aide often serves as the backbone of a physical therapy clinic, ensuring everything runs smoothly so that therapists can focus on patient care. Their responsibilities can range from direct patient care to administrative tasks and maintaining the therapy environment.

Direct patient care often involves helping patients move to and from treatment areas, assisting with light exercises or stretches under the direct supervision of a physical therapist, or helping patients with mobility issues navigate the clinic. They may also prepare hot and cold packs for therapy sessions, assist with certain therapeutic modalities like ultrasound or TENS (Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation), and even provide some patient education on using crutches, canes, or other mobility aids.

On the administrative side, Physical Therapy Aides schedule patient appointments, answer phones, and manage patient records. This often involves data entry to record patient progress and report it to the physical therapist. Some aides might also take inventory of supplies, clean equipment, and order new supplies as necessary.

Physical Therapy Aides also maintain the cleanliness and safety of the therapy environment. This can involve sanitizing equipment and treatment areas between patients, setting up or adjusting equipment for therapists, and ensuring that all supplies are organized and readily available.
